

Dick Newman of Corona del Mar, billed as "Master of Magic," baffled the audience with his illusory feats. He was aided by Dolly Yeargan.





CORONA DEL MAR-Few of his neighbors are aware that Mr. Goon-Bones lives at 424 Marguerite in Corona del Mar. In fact, even the name will mean nothing to a vast majority of people . . . this despite Billboard magazine having recently rated his records as having been played more than any other (of the instru-®

tion for a year on the juke boxes. He might well be called the least known big name of the popular music world. Chances are very good that you heard the contagious toe-tapping

rhythm that he creates with his "bones" if you have ever turned on the radio, watched television or listened to some one's choice

of juke box number.

In a contest last week, Hawthorne featured each day Mr. Goon-Bones' rendition of "Goof-us." Red Barber, sports an nouncing for one, of the games, remarked how much he enjoyed Mr. Bones and paused so that the listening audience could hear a portion of a number being played over the loudspeaking system.

From a childhood pastime of playing with musical bones, Mr. Goon Bones (real name is Ted Goon) has parlayed a hobby into an institution. Although he was considering vaudeville in 1929, the stage business collapsed before he started. Consequently, he entered business instead.

Entertains Patients

Hospitalized in 1944, Ted was once again drawn to his hobby. Encouraged by his fellow bed patients when he entertained them, he set about to work out a modern technique of the old minstrel art. He and his wife experimented with hundreds of materials for an improved "bone." Using woods from all over the feet standing still.

Ted's first recording "Ain't She Sweet" in 1949 was responsible for the revival of this old favorite and sold nearly a million platters. You will not be released from contract for any reason except at our election. If you are not completely happy with the terms of this agreement and unless you plan to live up to them, please do not sign this contract. You will only be causing both of us trouble. Please sign and return within five days all three copies of this agreement. One copy with our signature will be returned promptly to you. You will be notified within a week after that date as to when your first recording session will be held.



- 3. Individuals are authorized to use any mode of travel that they desire within continental limits of the United States. In lieu of subsistence a per diem allowance of \$7.00 is authorized while individuals are traveling and performing the above mission.
- 4. Reimbursement for the cost of transportation will be made upon completion of the trip as follows:

a. If travel is by privately owned automobile, individuals will be reimbursed at not to exceed a rate of 8 cents per mile and for bridge, ferry, and other highway tolls incurred while in a travel status under this order. 

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About This Book

In this book, Ted Goon (yes, that's his real name), originator of the names "GOON-BONES" and "GOON-BONE RHYTHM," explains in simple language exactly how to play the three easy movements which make up his famous "Goon-Bone Rhythm" that is now being played by folks from eight to eighty.

Ted has revived an art that died with the old-time minstrel shows and adapted it to modern rhythms. The result makes a fascinating recreation for everyone.

No musical education is required to be able to play Goon-Bone Rhythm. All you need is a set of genuine Goon-Bones, this book, and a little practice.

How to Play GOON-BONE RHYTHM

(By Ted Goon)

"Goon-Bone Rhythm" consists simply of variations of only three easy movements which I have named the "Roll," "Whip," and "Double Time, Single Time." When you have learned these movements you can play the Goon-Bones to any type of music with which you can keep time. You can play to many kinds of music by using only one of the movements.

Or, if you don't want to play to music at all you can have a lot of fun just manipulating the Goon-Bones.

For the first two movements it is almost as easy to play with both hands as it is one hand, because it is natural for both to want to do the same things at the same time.

How to Hold the Goon-Bones



The Goon-Bones are held the same for all three movements. Look at the figure above. Place one Goon-Bone between the first and second fingers, cupping the fingers around it, and gripping it firmly near the end. Then place the other Goon-Bone between the second and third fingers and hold it lightly against the first. Now you are ready to start.

The "Roll"




Figure 2 (Illustration for the right hand)

This movement was named the "Roll" because its pattern of continuous snaps resembles the "roll" of a drum. Look at the figure above. The easiest way to start the "Roll" is by holding the Goon-Bones near the chest, pointed downward. Keep the upper arm close to your side. Now remember this! In the "Roll" the fingers do not move. The pattern of snaps is obtained entirely by rotating the hand, wrist and forearm back and forth as one unit in a short arc. (What actually happens is that the movement of the hand. wrist and forearm pulls the Goon-Bones apart, and the constant, light pressure of the fingers brings them back together again, making the snaps.) Then rotate the hand, wrist and forearm as one unit about oneeighth turn out to the right and back again in a short arc. all as one quick movement. If you have followed instructions carefully you will hear and feel three quick snaps in a definite pattern. (Don't be discouraged if it doesn't work out the first time, because the natural tendency is to relax the fingers or to try to "cheat" by making the snaps by moving the fingers.) Then if you will rotate the hand, wrist and forearm as one unit back and forth continuously and smoothly you will hear a continuous "roll" of snaps in a definite rhythm pattern.

By practice and experiment in speeding up the movement, shortening the arc, and holding the second Goon-Bone firmer or lighter against the first you will find a wide variation in the speed of the snaps. This speed can be adjusted to the "time" of any music. However, be sure to master the movement before trying to play it to music.

The "Whip"



Look at the figure above. The "Whip" simply consists of four quick snaps taken from the "Roll." It is done merely by starting from the chest, rotating the hand, wrist and forearm out, back, and out again all as one quick movement, stopping the hand suddenly. You should hear a total of four quick snaps

in a definite rhythm pattern, with emphasis on the last snap.

When you have mastered this movement you will find that by regulating the speed of the four snaps you can do a "Whip" to every beat of the music, just as you might tap your foot with every beat.

"Double-Time, Single-Time"

This movement is actually the simplest of the three, although to some it is aggravating when first tried, and it takes practice until you get your hands coordinated.


By this time you have undoubtedly learned that you can make one snap easily in many different ways, such as rotating the hand, wrist and forearm out to the right and stopping suddenly, or just by relaxing and suddenly tightening the fingers, bringing the Goon-Bones together sharply. In the "Double Time, Single Time" movement you do two snaps with the left hand to each beat of the music while doing one snap with the right hand, making the one snap with the right hand coincide with the second snap of the left hand. The sound will be that of a light snap followed by a heavier snap. Get it working smoothly before trying it to music.


Remarks

When you have mastered the "Roll," "Whip" and "Double Time, Single Time" movements you have learned all you need to know to play to any kind of music. You can alternate the movements or make variations to suit yourself to bring out the particular rhythm pattern of the music. For example, to play with the "1-2-3" beat of Waltz Time you can do one snap with the left hand followed by two simultaneous snaps with both hands. If you like "syncopating" you can do that by making rhythm patterns with individual snaps. To make the tone different in each hand you need only to grip the Goon-Bones different distances from the end.

Rhythm On the Bones GOON BONES

In this Extended Playing album Mercury presents a most unique musical artist, the famed Mr. Goon Bones, one of the last of the bones players who at one time were an integral and delightful part of every minstrel show. Although the musical bones are rarely heard today on the stage or on podia, the tone they produce and the rhythmic effects which can be produced on them remain as distinctive and as enjoyable to listen to.

Mr. Goon Bones (Ted Goon) was taught to play the bones by his father when he was but 12. He mastered the fundamentals of the simple instrument quickly and, as his general education in music progressed, he readily realized that the bones, as then constituted, were not being exploited to the limit of their potentialities. By himself, he developed a new and radically different technique in manipulating them and began producing tonal and rhythmic results his father never dreamt possible. With the decline of vaudeville, however, the field for their professional use shrunk to nothing and the bones were relegated by Goon to the status of a hobby.

After the war Goon decided the time was ripe for a bones revival. Allying himself with concert organist and accordionist Barney Lantz, Goon formed a group which found steady employment and gradually developed a large and loyal coterie of fans. Their first Mercury recording, "Fast Freight Blues," an original composition, created quite a stir in musical circles. Goon's driving beat and the wonderfully descriptive sounds made by the other instruments made this a memorable platter. You will find the same qualities and fascinating effects in the selections in this album. As played by Goon Bones, they are no mere novelty. There is a fine display of musicianship in all of them.
